## Ask & Imagine: Insights from your Incumbent: Rev. Bonnie Skerritt Sept. 2022



Dear Friends in Christ,

I write this edition of "Ask & Imagine" in the midst of our time of mourning for our beloved late Queen. Perhaps like some of you, this has affected me a bit harder than I imagined that it would have. Although she was younger than my own late grandparents would be, it seemed to me that Queen Elizabeth II filled the role of "Universal Grandmother" to so many, regardless of age, race, or political affiliation.

Over the last few years, we have found ourselves living a reality that we couldn't possibly have predicted. We have faced change after change. It is hard to think ahead by a few months, let alone a few years. This latest change in the monarchy may push us near the brink of an identity crisis. Our Queen, a steadfast and enduring presence, always thinking of what was best for her people, is gone. Many parishioners that I have spoken with are cautious about what to expect from the new monarch, King Charles III. No doubt there will be more change.

Being uncomfortable with change is a part of the human condition. The Ancient Greek philosopher, Socrates, wrote "the secret of change is to focus all of your energy not on fighting the old, but on building the new". The Christian faith adds to this by encouraging us to look to the future, the new, with hope. In the present-day Pope Francis tells us that "This is Christian hope, that the future is in God's hands".

In our parish we have endured many changes, and probably will see more of them. Throughout this coming Fall our Diocesan Administrator, Walter Howell, and Diocesan volunteers for Congregational Development, Susan Abell and Val Whalley, will work with us in various ways and at various times to assist us in making changes to ensure a future for St. Paul's. This work brings to mind the words of the prophet Jeremiah, "For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." (Jer. 29:11). God is providing the opportunity. The question is will we make the most of it?

Over the coming months, I pray that each of us, in our own ways, embrace the future that lays ahead and with faith puts our whole hope in God's hands. Our late Queen knew that to put your faith in Christ was a solid rock on which you could depend. I pray that each of us may continue to look to her as an exemplar of faith.

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## **REMEMBERING QUEEN ELIZABETH II (1926 – 2022)**

On Thursday September 8th, many people around the world were shocked to hear the news of the passing of Queen Elizabeth II. Whether you were lucky enough to have met her in person, been at the many events she attended, or watched on television from afar, Queen Elizabeth II was a monarch like no other.

#### A few facts:

- Queen Elizabeth was born on April 21, 1916 in London, England. •
- She married Prince Phillip on November 20, 1947.
- She had four children: Prince Charles, Princess Anne, Prince Andrew, and Prince Edward.
- She ascended to the throne on Februrary 6, 1952 after the death of her father.
- Her coronation was held on June 2, 1953.
- In 2015: Queen Elizabeth II was the longest-reigning monarch in British history.
- February 6, 2022 was her 70<sup>th</sup> year on the throne. The first British monarch to celebrate a Platium Jubilee.
- During Covid, she used technology to continue to meet with people online.
- She visited 117 countries, and was head of state for 54 Commonwealth countries.
- She visited Canada 22 times as Queen, and once more as a princess.
- She promised to serve the British people for her whole life, and two days before she passed she met the new Prime Minister of Britain, Liz Truss, at Balmoral Castle. So, she kept her word.

#### The Canon's Corner: The Reverend Canon Greg Physick Sept 2022

A well-known parable speaks of feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, welcoming the stranger, clothing the naked, caring for the sick and visiting those in prison. I believe most of us have done something about the first five. As for the prisoner Jesus mentions, in my entire ministry, I have made one prison visit-- ironically to the Super Jail here in Lindsay. Friends had a son sent there and I must admit I found the jail cold, stark and sterile. The young man was kept behind a screen. There was no way I

was in harm's way, but rules are the rules. I was more comfortable sitting by the bedside of the ill, the dying--even when death entered in as life left.

There is another theme in our present time, that of housing. Many of us are blessed, yet we need only leave the comfort of our homes and we see the desperation from some on the sidewalks. We hear and know of those living in the woods around us. I don't know how much homelessness Jesus saw. We know at the time of his birth, there was no room in the inn. However, let us not forget, the innkeeper did find some temporary housing in a stable!

A fellow priest has approached the Rev. Bonnie about student housing and I have had a request about housing for another student attending Fleming here in town, too. 'There is no room in the Inn' is talked about, albeit in other terms, time and again in towns and cities across our land. It is a reality for many of all ages.

We are quite good at dealing with the hungry and thirsty ones, the recycling of our clothing and yes, caring for the sick. Strangers in the form of refugees are welcomed by many. The prison ministry is a reality in our town, but the purpose of my reflection at this time, given the housing requests is to put it out there and ask 'is there something our parish may be able to offer or do?' That being said, let us not forget our parish does own some houses behind the church and people are assisted and have been for some time. The homes are taken care of, the people pay their rent and at this time, Jesus must smile a little as some housing needs are addressed. Still, the need is great and getting more visible.

I have no new program to offer, no magic wand to wave and as with many, feel quite helpless. I volunteered for a program that sheltered people over night in church halls in winter months. The vulnerable had feet cared for by a nurse, cots for the night's sleep, volunteers who stayed in the hall overnight for safety. A breakfast was served and they went on their way.

Many are the needs and numbers of programs exist. So many sheep care and God's love is lived out. May we as a parish listen to the Spirit and be guided in some way. In a real sense so many of the homeless are prisoners to a way of life, strangers who often are unwell, who walk and sleep in tattered clothing. They are hungry and thirsty in more ways than one. We give thanks to the many people and organizations that bring some light into the darkness.

## PARISH MANAGEMENT TEAM: By Tom Ross

As most of you probably know by now, St. Paul's is currently operating through administration by the Diocese of Toronto. In our case, administration was made necessary after St. Paul's was unable to nominate two full-term Churchwardens (wardens) at our February Vestry. We were very fortunate to have Barb Truax and Max Radiff offer their services as interim wardens but their interim period has now passed and we now find ourselves "wardenless". Why is this a problem? According to our governance structure, the Rector's Warden and People's Warden together form the legal entity or Corporation of St. Paul's. In short, no wardens equals no St. Paul's, at least in a legal sense. A solution to this problem is for the Diocese to appoint an Administrator to the parish, the terms of which are specified in Canon 24. The Administrator takes on the legal responsibilities and authority of the absent Churchwardens and this allows the parish to continue to function. Administrators can be appointed for a maximum term of one year (with subsequent renewals possible).

In accordance with the administration guidelines, Mr. Walter Howell of St. John's, Peterborough was appointed Administrator of St. Paul's, effective May 19, 2022. A Management Team was subsequently struck to advise the Administrator and help "spread the load" of administration. In addition to Walter, the team is currently comprised of Rev. Bonnie, John Gundy, Fred Welling, Jo-Anne Burridge and myself (Tom Ross). Our meetings, which occur as required, are very much like typical Wardens Meetings (sans wardens). The team's goal is to fill, as much as possible, the role of wardens on a day-to-day basis. This is not a perfect solution, we are constantly finding jobs that wardens "just did", without any fanfare, that now need to be picked up by someone and we appreciate those who have quietly assumed these duties.

I'll already taken up enough of this article giving you the dry facts of what parish Administration is all about, but what are we doing? I'll just mention a few of our recent activities:

- 1) I'm happy to report that we have now hired a permanent Office Administrative Assistant, Mr. Scott Allan, effective August 29 th. While it is difficult to lose the many years of experience that Valerie brought to the office and parish, Scott brings with him extensive technical skills and experience. Be sure to stop by and say "Hi" the next time you visit the office and perhaps give Scott a few pointers as he tries to grasp the unique terminology that Anglicans use!
- 2) We are pleased to advise we have partnered with Kawartha Lakes Food Source to provide kitchen space for their virtual cooking program. The program is run by a professional cook and will be focused on the preparation of small batch food using ingredients sourced from the Food Bank. The program will initially run from August 11 through October with a short break in the middle.
- 3) In addition to her usual priestly duties, Rev. Bonnie has been working with two diocesan volunteers on Congregational Development. This is a parallel stream to Administration in order to exit from Administration, some "things" will invariably need to change. I'm sure that we'll be hearing more about this in the near future.
- 4) We continue to advocate for the use of Pre-Authorized Givings (PAG) as the preferred method of regular church givings and you will be hearing more on this from John Sale's team in the near future. We've already seen a significant increase in PAG use over the last few months but we're hoping for more. The key point is not the amount that is being offered but the regularity of giving. Thanks to all that have helped St. Paul's by signing up.

There's a lot going on at St. Paul's, which is nothing new. Today, as I write this, St. Paul's celebrates Welcome Back Sunday and marks what many think of as the real New Year in the church. Please take a moment to consider the various activities and events that are reported in this issue.

Finally, if you want to know what's going on with our team, just ask – we try to be fully transparent. We report at every Advisory Board but we're happy to discuss anything (that isn't, by nature, confidential) with anyone at any time. If you don't find us at church, our contact information is available through the office.


Don't forget that I am cutting back and Don Chase and Ray Marshall are taking over more projects and I will look after the paperwork. God Bless


As we look forward to the coming year, many hats mittens have materialized for King Albert School. We are also working on hats and scarves for the Seafarers.





## Celebrating 100 Issues of "THE GRAPEVINE" Newsletter (1997 – 2022)

Thus, a new Communication Group (Betty Tyndall, Muriel Kent, Barbara Brown, Ethel Morris, Anna Eyre, Susan Schrier, Barb Appleton, and Diane Hall) announced the creation of a "new" Grapevine newsletter. From the beginning, Betty Tyndall was the Editor, and Barbara Brown did the Computer Inputting role (Issues #1 – #34) and the process gradually went from a "cut & paste" "copy & print" style to a more sophisticated one. Of course, many others helped submit articles or photos, get sponsors, proofread, etc. over the years. For Issues #35 - #87, Betty Tyndall continued her role as Editor, and by 2011, she created the first colour Grapevine to commemorate St. Paul's 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary (Issue #56). In March 2019, Betty officially "retired" as The Grapevine Editor after 22+ years and Issue #87. Diane Stecher took over as Editor for Issues #88 - #100. Congratulations on 100 Issues!!! Here is a brief pictorial history of The Grapevine from 1997 – today!

## From the Music Director




During the summer, I spent time tidying up the music rooms, and creating a new inventory of the music we have. There were a few previous inventories, but from a number of years ago. I need more time to complete the inventory, but am excited at the amount of music there is! The choir enjoyed a summer break from regular evening rehearsals, but showed up early to make sure they were ready to sing each Sunday morning. I enjoyed having Rev. Frank Tyrrell playing his guitar with our choir on Sunday July 31st, which was reminiscent of our past Ultreya performances for Cursillo.

You might have noticed a different piano in the church: a Heintzman upright grand. The Samick baby grand piano that we had, while nice to look at, would simply not hold it's tuning at concert pitch - which is essential for church, livestreaming, and for other musicians or groups using our space for concerts. I noticed how within two weeks of a tuning, the Samick was already falling out of pitch. Our past organist, and piano tuner, Arlene Gray, gave her expert opinion and agreed that the Heintzman was a much higher quality piano, and was well worth having to replace the Samick. Fortunately, Mr. Shawn O'Neill donated the Heintzman free of charge, and Lindsay Movers & Storage also delivered the piano free of charge. A local family offered to pay to have the Samick relocated to their cottage, where despite not being at concert pitch, can still be enjoyed for casual playing. For those interested in piano history, this particular Heintzman was made in Toronto, during the era of more ornately designed pianos in the early 1900 - 1920s. It has beautiful wood carving on the front, more decorative turns on the legs, and a very rich tone typical of Heintzman pianos.


## **SEASON OF CREATION:**


