The Canon's Corner: The Rev. Canon Greg Physick June '24



The recent baptism found me in a 'special place of memories & thought'. I baptized many using the Book of Common Prayer & the Book of Alternative Services. The latter is my favorite and once again, it did not disappoint. Each liturgy is a reminder that one has been called. Water is poured on the head, the sign of the cross made on the forehead (often nowadays with holy oil). One is marked as Christ's own forever. Yes a vocation (from the Latin, 'vocare'—to call) is a reality. The Church has a history of speaking of 'vocation' when referring to the Monastic communities and the Clergy. Yet, baptism is about vocation for all the baptized.

Marked as Christ's own forever, each is called to live out the faith wherever we are. Over the years I became ever more aware of what Monday would bring for my people. They were teachers, doctors, mechanics, bankers, police officers, seamstresses, bakers, nurses, nursing home caregivers, homemakers, husbands, wives, partners and parents and......... Yes the list goes on and on. They lived out other kinds of vocations. They came to church with a thousand and one thoughts and concerns, seeking peace, forgiveness, strength and grace because they believed, or prayed to believe more. Each came and would be sent out to live out a most special vocation through baptism: to serve Christ in a variety of ways. Baptismal promises in the BAS service talk about seeking & serving Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself; about striving for justice and peace and respecting the dignity of all; One is called to continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread and in the prayers; to persevere in resisting evil and whenever one falls into sin, to repent and return to the Lord; to proclaim by word & example the good news of God in Christ. And lately, to strive to safeguard the integrity of God's creation and respect, sustain and renew the life of the Earth.

Such is the reality of the Christian's vocation. In between Sundays much was lived out, shortcomings were many—for all, including the priest! Yet, another Sunday came around and Word and Sacrament were offered to hungry souls and at times, shaky hands were presented along with watery eyes, at the altar rail—including the grease stained hands of the mechanic.

Episcopal priest, Barbara Brown Taylor writes: 'If the church is where we learn who and whose we are, the world is where we are called to put that knowledge to use. Answering the call requires no particular virtues. Those who have been marked as Christ's own forever have everything they need, but a good imagination helps. There is even a chance that the Christian vocation is above all a vocation to imagine—to see what God sees when God looks at the world, and to believe that God's dreams can come true.'

How is your vocation being lived out? Leave the past in the past. Our loving forgiving God offers grace for this day, for tomorrow—and tomorrow's tomorrow. Imagine and dream!

THE COLLECT FOR.....

Have you ever wondered about this prayer at the beginning of the service?

I asked my Mother, many years ago, what it meant and she told me it was a call to worship. Well, mom was close, it comes from a Latin word collecta while rather obscure, it refers to the "gathering of the people together" as well as the "collecting up" of the petitions of the congregation into one prayer.

Its a short prayer that asks for "one thing only" and is unique to churches in the Western world. So says Bishop's Barbee and Zahl in their book "The Collects of Thomas Cranmer".

Many of the collects still in use today are not only necessary to the liturgy, but also are part of the pastoral tradition of the Church, dating back to the turbulent times of our ancestors. Bishop Thomas Cranmer in The Prayer Book (1549) urges us to pray the Collects every day. Many of Cranmer's collects are still prayed in churches today.

Some of our Collects date back to the early Roman church. Imagine going into the 5th century church on a particular Sunday of the church year and knowing enough Latin to recognize with delight and surprise the very same prayer to be found for that day is in the Book of Common Prayer and in the BAS!

We have just been through LENT (short for lengthen, as in daylight). Shrove (means shive=confess pre-lent) Tuesday or Fat Tuesday or Mardi Graw, Pentecost and Trinity.

A Brief History: The first half of the Christian Year is used to set forth the great doctrines of the Christian religion ("the acts of our great Redeemer wrought") The second half teaches us practical duties, our response to what God has accomplished for us in Christ. Neither is complete without the other. Trinity Sunday links the two halves together. (Pg 68)

Its interesting that the two Collects for Pentecost and Trinity in the Book Common Prayer are the ones that Cranmer composed.

One of our former ministers encouraged us to TAKE THE BULLETIN (LEAFLET) HOME WITH YOU PRAY THE LORD'S PRAYER AND COLLECT EVERY DAY THROUGHOUT THE WEEK.

Lets see what 'practical duties' we can accomplish in the remainder of 2024.

The slate high up on the Church roof have not been repaired as yet and the taps over the rinse sinks in the kitchen need attention as in new valve inserts.

We repaired a bookshelf that was loose in the Choir section of the Church.

The bottoms of the storm windows of the Church have been removed for the summer and A/C units have been made ready for the summer as well.

We have the heat turned off to the Church as of early May and discovered two valves leaking.

We had the eavestrough cleaned out on the Rectory and have discovered a motion sensor not working on the Rectory as well.

34 Glenelg St has some old piping that has started to leak from the drain that will have to be replaced.

36 Glenelg had a leak from the drain from the bathtub and this has been repaired.

Heating system cleaning for houses is slated for July 24.



ST. PAUL'S ARCHIVES REPORT

The Archives Committee of St. Paul's has been busy for over two years collating the vast array of historic documents, photographs, and general history of St. Paul's. The full committee consists of Ian McKechnie, Barb Truax, and Lorna Green. We have been fortunate to have the guidance of Angela Fornelli, MSc. Manager, Corporate Records and Archival Services / Municipal Archivist, City of Kawartha Lakes.

In 2022, we realized that simply sorting through the documents was not enough. We needed to have the appropriate materials to store the documents, the capability to digitize photographs, and an archivist who would be responsible for organizing the endeavour. And so, the committee submitted a grant application to Library and Archives Canada, Documentary Heritage Community Programme(DHCP) for funds to update our archive collection. Unfortunately, we were not successful. However, in late 2023 we applied again and in March of 2024 we received confirmation that our application was successful and we were awarded \$20,638.00 for our project. This has allowed us to provide remuneration for our dedicated archivist, purchase a laptop and scanner, and acquire professional archival supplies. This will ensure the preservation of the history that St. Paul's has stored in our building.


On May 15th, our archivist officially began the task of organizing our archival collection. This will be an ongoing project over many years. We are delighted to have the funds available to carry on the preservation of our important role in the history of the City of Kawartha Lakes.
