## Ask & Imagine: Insights from your Incumbent Rev. Bonnie Skerritt Sept '23



Greetings!

Friends, after a lovely summer we once again find ourselves in the Season of Creation. It is that special time when the Church, across denominations and continents, looks to our role as stewards of Creation. It is an opportunity for the 2.6 billion Christians around the world to take stock of how we are doing and consider what we could do better as stewards of our Father's world.

And this is not just an issue that Christians are approaching from a faith-based perspective. In Jordan, over 6,000 mosques have been converted to solar power in response to a growing movement of environmentalism amongst Imams, and interfaith groups of Muslims, Jews and Christians in the area are working together to protect the Jordan River.

For me, the more that I read about faith-based responses to the climate crisis, and pray on this, the more convinced I am that people of faith have an active role to play in the wider conversation about care for our planet. As our youth have reminded us, "there is no Planet B".

In the months to come our Spiritual Development Committee will be bringing you opportunities to delve into the topic of faith & climate change. At this point, I would like to introduce you to the Christian climate scientist, Dr. Katherine Hayhoe, who believes that there is hope and that together we can fix the climate crisis. Dr. Hayhoe is the chief scientist for the Nature Conservancy and is also a Canadian, who is able to speak directly to the particular issues that Canada faces.

In the meantime, the most important things that we can do to address climate change is to talk about it and take ownership for our own households. In the Spring I was inspired by a member of our Advisory Board who spoke of unplugging items around the home that aren't being used and how that can reduce the use of electricity. Once again, we must recognize that little things mean a lot!

May we never forget the words of the psalmist, "Our help is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth" (Ps. 124:8).

# The Canon's Corner: The Rev. Canon Greg Physick Sept '23



Caution: This reflection may trigger painful memories. Please know there are people to talk to, those who will not judge, but walk with you and listen to you.

On Sept. 17 th we heard Matthew 18:21-35. The text about forgiveness holds a parable that ends with a harsh condemnation: the parable is about one who was forgiven a great amount of


debt, but did not forgive another who owed him a small amount. The unforgiving slave/ servant was handed over to be tortured until the debt is paid. The parable ends with 'so my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart'.

I wonder how others heard that parable. As we learned in Sunday School, a parable is an earthly story with a heavenly meaning, a means by which Jesus taught many things. They can be filled with hyperbole, with exaggeration. They are used to get attention!

For too long, such words heard in Matthew today are used by some clergy (of any denomination) when a woman or child speaks of being assaulted, abused, and/or raped by a loved one. 'Go home and be a dutiful wife. Forgive!' 'Listen to your father, your mother and honor them.' So many are not believed even by the other parent. (Yes, some men are violated by their spouses/partners too & similar words are given.)

In Luke's gospel (chap. 17:3-4), Jesus speaks about rebuking the one who has sinned and 'if he repents', forgive him. Of course, repentance has to be genuine, not lasting just a week until the next beating. The classic sequence of abuse, tears and 'I am sorry', and then more abuse and more tears and words of 'sorry' is a pattern known to many. Again I say: Do know there are clergy who will walk with you, listen to you, not judge you and certainly will not say 'forgive and go home right now'.

Forgiveness is not easy or 'instant'. It may take a very long time in some instances and one may die before any forgiveness is offered. **Continued on page 7.....**

Everyday grievances and hurts are forgiven much more easily in many situations. Even then, we may find it difficult. The theme of 'repentance' as noted by Jesus in Luke is a very important step on the journey. Of course, The Lord's Prayer holds the petition: forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. What is the Spirit saying to us at this time as we reflect on the theme of forgiveness?

As people of Christ we live in a broken world. We are wounded and we hurt others. We may seek forgiveness from others we have wounded—and certainly seek God's forgiveness each time we confess our sins. Most of this is done in the 'general confession' during a service and one may see his or her priest for private confession. The Anglican teaching about private confession is: 'none must, all may, some should'. I do not like using the word 'should' as it can come across so judgmental, yet at times it fits.

Our Christian faith teaches us that God in Christ is the ultimate judge, the one who offers love and forgiveness. As for the brokenness brought about by terrible abuse and violation of all that we are as a child or an adult, I do not for a moment believe the parable is to be taken literally when it says that our heavenly Father will hand one over to be tortured until the debt, in this case, forgiveness, is paid. To repeat, forgiveness may take a long time.

It seems St. Paul's words used in a closing prayer at the Eucharist is a good way to close, words for each of us to pray in our own brokenness and life's journey that holds wonder:

'Glory to God, whose power working in us, can do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine.'

It had been over 15 years since our last inspection, and the management team felt it important to know the current status before making any decisions on future property expenditures. This is particularly important as our current financial position is a concern.

Speaking of finances, to steal Don Brohm's tag line ("Just so you know"), the envelope offerings are falling 16% below budget year to date (app. \$19,000). As we start back in the fall this tends to improve; may it be so! We appreciate your generosity in supporting St. Paul's efforts at spreading the Good News both in Lindsay and abroad, thank you. To save money, we have gone back to "in house" janitorial services and will aim to curtail any expenses we can.

The "Spring Church Cleaning" is steadily progressing and the dungeon is starting to look more and more like a well organized basement. The work will continue with attention going to the storage container in the parking lot, the former youth area, the Sunday School area, and all the various nooks and crannies we've stuffed things over the past several decades. The number of things being found that we can use and/or will never use is amazing, and are being actioned!

Rev. Bonnie and John Sale have put together a two-session program called "Are You Prepared?", addressing the many issues that one confronts as they approach life's end. It will be a great opportunity to get information you might need (and maybe a little push) for you to put these affairs in order. Please consider signing up for the Sept 19th & 26th sessions by calling the office.

Thank you for the work each of you do at St. Paul's. Thank you to those who visit the nursing homes on our behalf. Thank you to those who sing in our choir, read lessons and act as lay readers to enhance our worship service. Thank you for the support you give one another, both within the church and the community. May we continue to do our best to "Know Jesus, and to make Him known".

On behalf of the parish, thanks to our Wardens Betty, and Paul for stepping up and taking on essential roles at St. Paul's! Thanks to Rev. Bonnie and the rest of the Management Team as well! I like good news first; so let's start with some. All rents are up to date and so we say God Bless our Tenants.

Now for some not so good news; as always repairs have to be made; some caused by old age and some by a strong hail and wind storm.

38 Glenelg lost a storm window (upper) due to hail and some leaking taps due to old age. (Lower) 38 required a tree to be removed; paid for by our Tenant.

32 Glenelg had some roof damage due to critters.

The Church roof has some slate that needs some attention up on top of the Church on the West side. We also have some cement work to be done by the entrance door in the hall. We had Dan Scott (The Roofer) go over our buildings and other than what is reported; we fared pretty well from the storm.

We have had the heating systems looked at for the fall for our Tenants and other than a couple of valves for the boilers we did very well.

41 Russell needs some ceiling work done as old paint is peeling off the ceiling and this is being looked after and we had some loose boards on the wheelchair ramp and this has been taken care of as well.

Things have been fairly quiet over the summer, except for the blessing, placing and stocking of St. Paul's Food Pantry in early August. So far it is obvious that this source of non-perishable food is much needed in our surrounding community as most items are seldom on the shelves for more than 2 days. We would like to thank our parishioners and our guest Tai Chi Club for so many ongoing food and hygiene donations. We are especially grateful to the lady who asked for food donations for us as part of her birthday celebrations. This was requested instead of personal gifts to this very generous lady. As a result we received a very large number of food items and several grocery gift cards. We hope and pray for continuing support from our congregation and others as well. We would be glad to hear from anyone who would volunteer to stock the shelves for one week on Sunday, Wednesday and Friday as we draw up a roster of volunteer "stockers" for the fall.

On June 24, in conjunction with the Spiritual Development Committee, we hosted an Indigenous Reconciliation program from PWRDF called Mapping the Ground We Stand On. It was a very meaningful and informative afternoon. On September 16 a group from St. Paul's will attend the annual Curve Lake First Nations Pow Wow. All are welcome.

**Foster Children:** we have recently received updates from Juan our SOS Village child in Chile and Kevin in Honduras. Both are doing well. We have a brief report that our 3 sponsored children in Haiti are safe. Little else is known.


