Ask & Imagine: Insights from your Incumbent Rev. Bonnie Skerritt March 2024



At different points over the winter we have looked at Creation Care, mostly through the videos of a YouTube Channel called "Global Weirding" hosted by environmental scientist Dr. Katharine Hayhoe. At times our ventures into technology have let us down, especially while trying to show the videos to groups. However, the messages that Dr. Hayhoe shares have always been both entertaining and informative. As a Canadian and an active Christian, Dr. Hayhoe has helped us to enter into the conversation from a place similar to our own. More than that, her videos have helped the few of us who gathered to watch and discuss them, to think more personally about

climate change and small things that we can do to help our planet. It has also helped us to appreciate that these small things can be done, not from a place of guilt, but from a place of love and a desire to follow the way of Jesus.

Did you know that major faiths all around the world, including Christianity, Hinduism, Islam and Judaism have issued declarations on climate change? One thing that they all agree on is that we have a duty to care for others (the Golden Rule) and to protect Creation. This has led to a number of inter-faith statements, including one between the World Council of Churches, the Muslim Council of Elders, the New York Board of Rabbis and the UN on our moral responsibility to the billion children identified by UNICEF as being at "extremely high risk of the impacts of the climate crisis". These risks include coastal flooding and the loss of the ability to produce food.

As Christians, Jesus repeatedly asked us to care for one another. John 13:34 says "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." Even though we have just begun to see signs of climate change here in Central Ontario, we know that it is negatively impacting a large swath of the population in other parts of Canada and around the world. It is for our neighbour and for generations to come that we are called to acts of love.

The good news is that each of us can do something positive to combat climate change. For example, each household that changes their lightbulbs from incandescent to LED saves ½ a tonne of carbon from entering the environment per year. St. Paul's has 155 households that make up our parish. If each of us made this change, that would save approx. 77 tonnes of carbon per year, just from that small change.

The booklet "A Lenten Fast for the Earth" from the Bishop's Committee on Creation Care has a number of good suggestions that can be done year-round. They range from the very simple, like turning off the water while you brush your teeth, to those that require a small lifestyle change. An example of this is reducing the amount of meat that we eat. By making this tweak to our lifestyle, it reduces the amount of greenhouse gas emissions as most of our meat comes from large producers, and factory farming creates a large percentage of these emissions. A study out of Oxford University suggests that greenhouse gas emissions could be reduced by 30% in 25 years simply by reducing our meat consumption. There are many other suggestions in this booklet, which is available at St. Paul's.

I leave you with this verse from the First Epistle of John, "Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action." (1 John 3:18)

These words are, of necessity, written in Lent for our Easter Grapevine. Both seasons are on my mind as I write these words. But isn't this the reality of our lives? We are never just in one season of life. At any moment, we can find ourselves reliving something in our past, making plans for 'down the road'—all the while dealing with the issues of the present time.

Lent began with ashes and a wilderness: reminders to us of our own mortality and also new life out of death and the Spirit's presence and the ministry of angels in wilderness times. The season moves along into Holy Week

with its joy, palms and cheers. The week holds a most special last supper with the washing of feet and a new commandment to love one another. Then we stand outside the city walls and listen to the crowd calling out 'crucify him'.

Again, we are never just in that moment, for we know the rest of the story! Our disciplines of giving up and taking on come to an end as Easter Day dawns. For many, the atmosphere is palpable. Psalm 34, v.8 comes to mind: 'taste and see that the Lord is good; happy are they that trust in him'. In each of our seasons, may Easter hold a place. Seldom if ever, are we just in one time or season. Whether Pope John Paul 2nd originated it, quoted St. Augustine or another, may we hold tightly to this: 'we are Easter people, and alleluia is our song'. A blessed Easter to you-- in every season of life may a taste of Easter be discovered.

Highlights of the 2024 Annual Vestry Meeting—February 25, 2024

The Annual Vestry Meeting was called to order at 12:05 p.m. There were 51 members in attendance. Reverend Bonnie Skerritt opened the meeting with prayer. Janice Ross was appointed Vestry Clerk. Barb Truax & Betty Hooper were appointed Scrutineers. The March 5, 2023 Annual Vestry Minutes, and the June 25, 2023 Special Vestry Minutes were accepted as written.

<u>Video from Bishop Andrew Asbil – Season of Spiritual Renewal.</u> This short video was viewed by all in attendance.

Incumbent, Wardens and Committee Reports

Reverend Bonnie Skerritt had presented her report during her Homily that morning. She expressed her gratitude to the wardens and the management team for all their efforts. Warden Paul Carpentier thanked Tom Ross for all his efforts as Treasurer, especially the extra work needed since the Church bookkeeper, April Russell, passed away suddenly in December. A volunteer is needed soon to replace Tom as Treasurer effective October 1, 2024, otherwise someone will have to be hired.

Audited 2022 Financial Report

The 2022 Audited Report arrived Dec. 18, 2023. Tom Ross made the following motion: "That the audited 2022 financial statements and report, as received from Peter Shennet Professional Corporation, be accepted by Vestry". Accepted.

Highlights of the Financial Report 2023: Tom Ross, Treasurer

Tom Ross thanked Marlene Wood (Envelope Secretary), Marg Brohm (Designated Givings), Don Brohm (rental properties and rent) and Linda Todd (Gift Cards) for their dedication and help throughout the year. He remembered with thanks April Russell, who passed away suddenly at Christmas after 6 years of service as the Church bookkeeper.

Tom made the following motion: "That the unaudited 2023 Financial Report, as presented, be accepted by Vestry, subject to audit verification". Accepted.

In summary, although our expenses were stable in 2023, we had much less income than we currently require. Total receipts for 2023 were 10.8% under budget, total disbursements were 0.02% over budget. Envelope offerings and most fundraisers were below budget, and no diocesan grants. While the performance of our endowment funds actually covered our deficit, those funds are designated for specific purposes. Warden Paul Carpentier mentioned other cost savings measures: reduced office hours, building overheating issues resolved, and thanked Marg and Don Brohm for donating their time as Church custodians.

Highlights of the 2024 Budget

Tom Ross thanked the members of the Finance Committee, Management Team and the Advisory Board for their help and input. Motion to accept the 2024 Budget, as presented. Accepted. Most budget figures are as per 2023 actual, so not a lot of change. We are budgeting for a surplus of \$8,882 which includes a bequest. Motion to approve the 2024 budget was Accepted.

Appointments and Elections

Doug Read has been nominated as an alternate delegate to Synod. Kim Walsh has been nominated as an Advisory Board Member at Large. Both were Acclaimed. Barb Truax was appointed to the Parochial Tribunal.

Other Business:

Reverend Bonnie presented the Social Justice Vestry Motion 2024: Protecting and Advancing the Right to Housing. It was noted that this parish protects the right to affordable housing through our rental properties. Reverend Bonnie made a motion to respond to the Social Justice Motion this way: "We the parish of St. Paul's Lindsay support the spirit of the motion. However there are particulars within it that require clarification". Carried. No one opposed. Meeting was adjourned at 1:30pm.

The noisy pump on the Church heating system that was pulled and repaired has now been reinstalled and working just fine. We had a bleeder valve in the Church heating system that had to be replaced.

Ray/Don removed a tree branch that had fallen on the parking lot behind 32 Glenelg St W.

We have installed new taps in the Ladies washroom on the main floor which makes them easier to turn on and off.

We still have some slate high up the Church roof that need to be repaired.

The installing of new thermostats and zone control valves has given us better control over the heating system in the Church and Church hall including lower main and upper.



What's Up With The Archives?

Jesus spoke about the Kingdom of God having its origins as a small mustard seed and growing into a tree in which the birds would come and perch in its branches.

This parable seems appropriate when talking about the archives at St. Paul's. Over the last year and a half, a team comprising of Lorna Green, Ian McKechnie, and Barb Truax – working in consultation with Angela Fornelli, the City of Kawartha Lakes amazing and ever-encouraging archivist – have been planting small "seeds" in the hope of growing them into an attractive and uncluttered space where the parish's vast archival collection will be made accessible to parishioners and researchers alike.

And what do these "seeds of progress" look like? Well, they include spending a few hours carefully removing hundreds of photographs from albums, meticulously numbering them, and filing them into acid-free envelopes. They also involve judiciously sorting books, paper artefacts, and other items into piles before discerning what we should do with them: Do our parochial records have a clearly-established provenance at St. Paul's and help tell our story? Or might they only have a tangential relationship to the congregation, and would they be better off at another institution? And what records do we still have that really must be transferred to the diocesan archives in Toronto?

All of these are important questions that we discuss at length as we work through the collection housed in a small room just off the Marsh Memorial Hall. A congregational archive is more than simply a repository for "old stuff" – it is a living organism that will evolve over time, as everything that we do in the present becomes part of our collective history as a community of faith in Lindsay. To that end, we want to ensure that our archives are appropriately housed and access to them increased via digitization — and we have applied for funding to help get us to this stage.

Having been attending occasional services and special events at St. Paul's for only seventeen years, much of what I see in the archives has been an education for me. It is heartwarming to see photographs and read the stories of how this congregation has made a difference in the lives of its parishioners and in the broader community over the years. As the old hymn so adequately puts it:








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OUTREACH COMMITTEE by Gail Payne

Your Outreach Committee last met on March 3, 2024 as we continue to try to be the voice, feet and hands of our Lord Jesus' love in our world, on behalf of St. Paul's.

<u>Stamp Out Poverty:</u> thanks to many contributions from the parish, we have been able to continue to collect used postage stamps for Oxfam's Stamp Out Poverty Campaign.

<u>King Albert School:</u> during the fall and early winter we collected several totes of winter clothing for the students.

<u>Queen Victoria School:</u> we have been collecting mitts and socks for the students as requested by the school in January. One bin has been delivered and there is another waiting for more donations in the parish hall.

<u>Mission to Seafarers:</u> we delivered 2 large bags of knitted toques, scarves and mitts to the Mission. The items were all supplied by The Sisterhood.

<u>Angel Tree:</u> we received requests for gifts for 6 area children but were unable to contact 2 of the caregivers responsible for 4 children. Therefore we bought, wrapped and delivered gifts for 2 children only.

<u>Spring Outreach Service:</u> Rev. Frank Tyrell will be speaking to us about Prison Chaplaincy on April 14, 2024.

<u>Food Pantry:</u> we have been able to receive a full range of food donations over the winter as Paul Carpentier kindly installed a temperature sensitive light inside the box to keep cans from freezing. In conversation with management at the Food Source outlet in Queen's Square, they do not feel our pantry is redundant as their days of operation are opposite to ours and clients are only eligible once per month. Our stores are currently running a bit low. We welcome all food donations.

<u>A Governance plan for Outreach:</u> was presented by Gail and improved with the help of Donna Gushue. Thank you Donna for your time and patience.

<u>Foster Children:</u> there have been no changes with our children. Our 3 children in Haiti seem to be safely away from most of the violence.

Family Time Activities: Learning about Palms

Here are some ideas to share with your children or grandchildren about Palms, which figure in our readings for Palm/Passion Sunday.

An excerpt from *Rings, Kings and Butterflies: Lessons on Christian Symbols for Children* by Harriet VanderMeer

<u>Verse to Learn:</u> Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven! *Luke 19:38*

A Children's Message

A palm tree grows very tall and stately. Its long, slender trunk has leaves only at the very top; they burst into the sky almost like fireworks. The land of the Bible had the right balmy, warm climate for palm trees, and they were a welcome sight to many people as they traveled. Palm trees and their leaves were very important where Jesus lived, and they were used in festivals...The people in the Bible times thought the leaves of the palm tree were like arches, so when they were victorious in battle, they carried palm leaves to celebrate and treat the winners as kings. When Jesus entered Jerusalem, they spread palm leaves out in front of him as though he were a king.

The palm tree almost looks like a person with feet firmly planted in the ground, arms and hands stretched up to the sky. The Bible actually compares a person to a palm tree: "The righteous flourish like a palm tree" (Psalm 92:12). The palm leaves in our church [on Palm Sunday] are used to help us celebrate Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, so we can welcome him just as the people of Jerusalem did long ago. On Sunday Jesus comes into the city like a king, but many things change as the week goes on. On Friday he is crucified on the cross.

The palm tree is not like a maple or oak tree, whose leaves change to yellow or red or brown in the fall. It is like an evergreen tree that is green all year long. The palm tree can remind us of Jesus, who has roots on earth and is tall and kingly, with leaves bursting out and reaching to heaven, where he prepares a place for us. Jesus is like the Tree of Life, giving us life everlasting. If we place three palm leaves together, we have one for Jesus, God the Son; one for God the Father; and one for God the Holy Spirit: the Three in One. We need to spread our leaves out for Jesus and thank him for preparing our way.

Pray with Children

Dear Jesus, we thank you for your humble yet royal ride on the donkey into Jerusalem. May we grow like palm trees in a desert oasis, praising you as our Saviour, Lord, and King of the World. Amen.

To Do Together

Take a field trip to a botanical garden or search the Internet to learn about different kinds of palm trees. Look carefully at the trunk, leaves, and the fruit of the palm tree. Draw diagrams and pictures of different kinds of palm trees. Check a globe or map and find where palm trees grow.

CHANCEL GUILD REPORT

The Chancel Guild is responsible for preparing the church each week for the Sunday church service, clearing up after the service as well as any special services during the week such as Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, funerals and weddings. As we have eight volunteers working in teams of two we are on duty for one week a month. Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas we all work together to decorate the church.
