# Ask & Imagine: Insights from your Incumbent Rev. Bonnie Skerritt Dec. 23



This Advent our annual study revolves around the book Advent in Narnia: Reflections for the Season. This is based upon C. S. Lewis' "Chronicles of Narnia", which I first encountered at the tender age of nine. I have "visited" Narnia many times since then and am always in awe of the lion, Aslan, who represents Jesus.

Time and again I have spent many moments contemplating one line in particular. It occurs as the two heroines, Susan and Lucy, speak with Mr. Beaver about Aslan's return. They have questions

about Aslan and if he is safe. Mr. Beaver responds, "Who said anything about safe? 'Course he isn't safe. But he's good. He's the King, I tell you."

Over the years, as my own spirit has matured, I have come to realize the truth about this response. Following Jesus' lead is just about the least "safe" thing that one can do. It often leads us outside of our comfort zone and stretches us in ways that expand our heart, our spirit and our mind. Esteemed Civil Rights leader, John Lewis once said, "Speak up, speak out, get in the way. Get in good trouble, necessary trouble". As a Baptist minister, and peer of Billy Graham and Martin Luther King Jr., Mr. Lewis knew a thing or two about Jesus and what being a follower of Christ called us to do and to be.

As we turn our thoughts to Christmas, there can be no doubt that Mary & Joseph, arguably the first Christians, experienced trouble which began shortly after the angel Gabriel's visit. A young teen girl, pregnant out of wedlock and a fiancé who's wondering what to do with her is the start of the troubles, and as we know, it only gets worse as they eventually find themselves far from home with nowhere to go and the baby on its way. While there is no doubt that the birth of the Christ-child was a magnificent scene lauded by heavenly angels and lowly shepherds alike, it is good for us to remember that disruption began even before the Prince of Peace entered our world. No one can change the world in the way that Jesus changed the world without causing some disruption, some trouble to the old ways of doing and being. That tiny infant in the manger turned the whole world upside down and this is what we celebrate; the "good trouble" that he brought with him culminated in our redemption and salvation. Alleluia!

This Advent & Christmas, I encourage you to follow Jesus outside of your comfort zone and into "good trouble". Reach out to the poor, the lonely, the sick, the hungry in ways that you may not have done before. In these difficult times, even a small action, like a smile, can have a great impact on another's life. Take time to reflect upon our Advent and Christmas readings and notice if something new is revealed to you this year. Pray for Holy Spirit to show you how you can help others, in small ways and large, and be open to the leading of the Spirit.

My prayer for you is that God may richly bless you during this special season in unexpected ways. *In Christian love, Rev. Bonnie*

# The Canon's Corner: The Rev. Canon Greg Physick Dec. '23



Isaiah 40:3 In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God.

The carnage of war fills our news, along with the looks of many who find no room in the inn, and stories of overburdened food banks. A fatigue can settle in for so much can feel overwhelming. Still the ancient words come forth: prepare the way.... Make straight in the desert a highway... Words from Ecclesiastes often whisper in my mind. "There is nothing new under the sun." John the Baptist, his cousin Jesus and the others, lived under a foreign regime and many hard-

ships. John spoke to a people who looked for light in the darkness, hope in their time of despair. He spoke of the one who was to come. John spoke of not just any 'way' or 'highway' but "the way of the Lord... a highway for our God.": Images from Isaiah, writing in a time of war and the Babylonian exile. Isaiah and later John spoke of hope in broken times. And hope walked in the wilderness, in the person of Jesus Christ.

We too have our own desert moments--wilderness moments. The ancient words are heard each Advent. Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. We listen, watch, agonize and yes, pray to understand what it means for each of us to 'prepare the way', to 'make straight in the desert a highway'. We are called to be faithful even when there is so much chaos. Where is God in all of this? In this season of wonder and expectation, may we do what we are able to prepare the way, to lesson the twists and turns of God's highway, that God's grace, love and wonder may not be met with those turns and bends that can cause one to waver and lose hope as they shout out: 'How long, O Lord, how long?'

Again the news comes forth: Onto the paths of our challenges, into our desert and wilderness moments, Jesus Christ comes, as he did in that Judean wilderness, with purpose and intent. He would call the people to walk with him, to be witnesses of God's love and care. They discovered such in their time as we must in ours. Christ comes again, for we give birth to him anew in our deeds and words.

Anglican priest Herbert O'Driscoll wrote this almost 25 years ago: "the atmosphere of our time is full of the sense of enormous changes....We feel helpless in the face of this great transition from a known past to an unknown and rather intimidating future. John told people that they had to get ready to live in a very different kind of world. So it is for us..."

Yes, nothing new under the sun. In the chaos of this time, still the message goes forth: *prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God.* 



- The shrubs at the front of the hall and church have been significantly trimmed back and Ray Marshall has hauled them off to re-cycling. Thanks Don Chase, Don Brohm and Ray.

#### What is Blue Christmas?

Blue Christmas services are typically held on December 21<sup>st</sup> as it is the darkest day of the year. In some parishes, the service is called the "Longest Night of the Year Service".

Blue Christmas services were developed as a pastoral response to those who, for a wide variety of reasons, are having difficulty with the Christmas season. It may be that they are experiencing loneliness, depression, grief, loss, some other sort of pain or just find Christmas Eve services too much for them. These are low-key services which strives to find a balance between acknowledging Christmas and that this can be a very difficult time for some folks. In our service at St. Paul's, we take time to remember those we love but see no longer and light candles in memory of them.

These services are typically held in the evening, however this year our Worship Committee and Rev. Bonnie decided to try having the service at 11:00 am as so many of our parishioners have difficulty with getting around in the dark. We encourage you to join us this year and stay afterwards for a time of fellowship over a soup luncheon.



#### **CHURCH PROPERTY UPDATE**



Don Brohm, Church Property Manager, assisted by Ray Marshall and Don Chase

As reported in the September grapevine all rents continue to be up to date and we say Thanks and God Bless our Great Tenants.

We have had to deal with some repairs as 32 Glenelg upper needed new taps and vanity for the bathroom as old age takes its toll and a leak in the bathtub drain pipe was cause for concern but has been looked after along with a leak in the basement. We also had a smoke alarm that wouldn't shutoff in 32 upper that had to be dealt with. 36 Glenelg required a new stove for their kitchen and 38 upper required a new tap on the bathtub and 38 lower required repairs to kitchen tap as well. The veranda roof on 36 Glenelg will need to be replaced in 2024 due to the age.

We had some loose boards on the wheelchair ramp at Midwives (Rectory) and that has been looked after. Midwives as did the Church had trouble with homeless sleeping in behind bushes at the Church and on the veranda at Midwives. Extra light seems to have remedied the problem along with bush removal.

We replaced two zone control valves in the Church hall which gives better control over the heating of the building. All the A/C units are now covered up for the winter and the portable A/C unit put away. Our heating system required attention as in circulating pump showing evidence of bearings needing attention; so the backup pump was activated and noisy pump pulled and sent out for new bearings.

#### **SYNOD REPORT** By Lorna Green

The 162nd session of the Anglican Diocese of Toronto Synod met at the Sheraton Parkway Hotel, Richmond Hill on November 17th and 18th 2023. Present from St. Paul's Church, Lindsay were the Reverend Bonnie Skerritt, lay Synod delegate Lorna Green, and alternate delegate Barb Truax.

After registration of clergy and delegates, there was an opening Eucharist at 9:30 celebrated by Bishop Andrew Asbil. A call to order followed.

Bishop Asbil welcomed all and expressed his gratitude for the first in person meeting of Synod in 4 years. The bishop gave an inspiring talk that touched on looking to the future, letting go, and following the call to cast the net to grow the church in membership and in spiritual life. We have used creative solutions to solve problems during Covid and it is hoped that we continue on that path.

The call for Cast the Net was titled: Followers of Jesus, inspired by the Holy Spirit, serve the world God loves. Twenty calls to the diocese were shared and listed under four categories:

- 1. Renewing Spirituality
- 2. Inspiring Faith in Action
- 3. Reimagining Ministry
- 4. Transforming Diocesan Culture.

Br. Reginald Crenshaw and the Rev. Canon David Bryan Hoopes of the Order of the Holy Cross led mid-day prayers. Bishop Asbil informed Synod that the Holy Cross Priory was closing in May 2024 after several decades of service.

Throughout the meeting we were shown videos of missional and outreach moments from individual parishes. Some of the subject matters were:

- Hiking Church: holding services outdoors with an emphasis on appreciating God's glory in nature. 1.
- Scarborough Steeplechase: a group of Anglican churches in Scarborough spent a day meeting at each 2. other's buildings.
- The Common Table (Church of the Redeemer) 3.
- Children and Youth programmes (All Saints Peterborough) 4.

Eight breakout sessions were held Friday afternoon around the following topics:

- 1. Wills, Estates, and Tax
- **Discerning Vocations** 2.
- 3. Where Have All the Volunteers Gone?
- 4. Children's Ministry Conversation Starters
- 5. Luscophone Ministry in Toronto
- 6. Regional Ministry Approaches
- 7. Parish Finances
- 8. Property Mandate from Synod

The Synod Banquet on Friday evening welcomed the Bishop of Brasilia as guest speaker. He spoke about his hopes for the companionship program between the Diocese of Toronto and the Diocese of Brasilia.

"Partnership is our strength," he said, adding that the dioceses can do much together to serve their commu nities. He spoke about the diversity of both dioceses and the mission of God in their communities. Morning prayer on Saturday was led by the Sisters of St. John the Divine.

Following that, there were elections for members of the Synod Council, General Synod, and Provincial Syn od. Those names may be found on the diocesan website.

The final charge from Bishop Asbil at the closing of Synod was the following:



# FAMILY TIME ACTIVITIES: LEARNING ABOUT ANGELS

Here are some ideas to share with your children or grandchildren about Angels, which are often in Advent & Christmas bible readings, and the carols we sing.

An Advent excerpt from Rings, Kings and Butterflies: Lessons on Christian Symbols for Children by Harriet VanderMeer

<u>Verse to Learn</u>: And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heaven-host, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!'

#### A Children's Message

You can put many things on top of your Christmas tree. Some people put a star there and some put a big bow. Some people put a bird up there or their favourite decoration. One of the most beautiful decorations for the top of the tree is an angel. With an angel on top of your tree, you proclaim with the angel that Jesus is coming!

Angels are messengers. Sometimes angels sing their message, sometimes they shout, sometimes they play instruments, sometimes they whisper, and sometimes they are quiet. Angels appear to tell the story or make an announcement. They say, "Fear not!" or they shout, "Behold!" or they sing, "Holy, Holy," There are angels of proclamation with a forceful message. There are angels of protection, they quietly surround you, guard you, and take care of you. People sometimes refer to "an angel on my shoulder watching over me." Angels guided the Israelites out of the wilderness. They were guardian angels.

There are also praising angels in the Bible, who show us how to worship and praise God. We sing as they did when we sign, "Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty." Little angels sometimes called "cherubs." A young children's choir may be called a "cherub choir" because they look and act like cherubs.

The Advent and Christmas stories are filled with angels. A proclamation angel comes to announce the forerunner of Jesus, John the Baptist. A pronouncing angel tells Mary that she will have a baby, Jesus. Praising angels give the message to the shepherds to go to Bethlehem to see the newborn king. Singing angels sing, "Glory to God in the Highest". A messenger angel tells Joseph to leave and take the baby to Egypt. And finally, when Herod dies and it is safe, a guardian angel takes Jesus back to Israel.

During this Advent season, we need to look for all angels around us: angels of preparation, telling us to get ready for Jesus; angels of promise, telling us Jesus is coming; angels of praise, showing us how to worship Jesus; angels of patience, teaching us how to search and wait for him; angels of proclamation announcing the birth of Jesus. Christmas trees are exciting to get and fun to decorate. Instead of looking to see what is under the tree, put an angel on top of your tree. Then raise your head, look, and listen. Do you hear the angel whispering, "Gloria in excelsis Deo"?

#### Pray with Children

Dear God, may we hear your angels as they proclaim Jesus' birth. May we join the angels in praising you this Christmas season, and sing with them throughout the year. Amen.

#### To Do Together

Look through your books, Christmas cards, and in some stores to see how angels are depicted. Do they have wings and halos? What colour are their robes? Where are they located in the picture? Draw or make a variety of angels to decorate your Christmas tree or wrapping paper. Make and display a collage of the angels from past years' Christmas cards.
