

So it is, I leave the State aside and speak about Church & Faith. Our Church gives us the season of Advent to prepare to celebrate the birth of the one who is, who was and who is to come. (Rev. 1:8) These words were heard at the end of November on The Reign of Christ Sunday --also known as Christ the King Sunday. It is this Christ Jesus who is







What's Going On In The Archives? By Ian McKechnie

When the late Ross Smyth invited me to take on the responsibility of overseeing St. Paul's archives in 2019, I really had no idea just what I was getting into. I had of course been granted a glimpse of the archive room and knew that the collection was fairly large – and I was only too aware that the task before me was, for lack of a better adjective, formidable.

Fast forward to the end of 2021, when I invited Ms. Angela Fornelli, Manager of Corporate Records & Archival Services for the City of Kawartha Lakes, to pay the archives a visit and offer some professional guidance on how to best manage and rationalize the collection. Conversations with Angela, along with our own Barb Truax and Lorna Green, led us to make an application to Library and Archives Canada's Documentary Heritage Communities Program (DHCP) grant in 2023, which we were unsuccessful in securing. In the meantime, the St. Paul's Archives Committee – myself, Barb, and Lorna – worked with Angela and a couple of summer interns from the municipality's records centre to get at least a head start on rehousing the records and other archival material at St. Paul's.

We then went back to the drawing board in the late autumn of 2023, made some tweaks to our previous application, and reapplied to the DHCP. This time, we were given the green light by Library and Archives Canada, which announced on March 28, 2024, that it would be contributing \$20,634 towards our project – a project that would see us describe, rehouse, and ultimately increase access to St. Paul's vast collection of archival holdings.

After some preliminary steps in mid-April (i.e. procuring a computer, preparing a list of required supplies), I dived into the task of being the parish's first paid archivist. I began where Angela's interns had left off the previous summer – by continuing the process of rehousing records that had previously been kept largely in cardboard boxes. Thus, an ancient-looking parish scrapbook, a vast collection of newsletters and leaflets, and numerous papers and ledgers from the Women's Auxiliary, the Parish Workers, and other organizations all went into brand-new acid-free folders, which in turn were placed in special acid-free Neutracor-branded boxes. I then set about adding accession numbers to these records in preparation for eventual cataloguing. An example might look something like this:

2024.001.012 \rightarrow **2024** (the year in which the records were formally accessioned), **001** (the accession number itself – a single accession can cover dozens of boxes!), and **012** (the 12th item included within that particular accession). Where there are multiple items included within something else (e.g. loose inserts in a service leaflet, loose papers within a ledger book), the number may look like this: 2024.001.012a – with the individual items therein being labelled 2024.001.012b1, b2, b3, etc.

It is of course very easy to become overwhelmed by the sheer volume of records and to get bogged down in the minutiae of it all. In the interests of time, much of this cataloguing work will be deferred to 2025. By the middle of July, my focus had shifted from cataloguing to imposing order and rehousing. A brief word about each of these activities and why they are important:

Imposing order. Nestled among the notes Ross left me was a detailed list of what was included in the St. Paul's archival collection. This list was very helpful – though in some ways it was more like a guidebook that listed various destinations and attractions rather than a road map offering directions to those destinations.

Nor did it offer answers to some important questions: who donated specific records, and when did they arrive in the archives? Occasionally some clues surfaced: a name scrawled across an envelope, a date on a postit-note. Where the provenance (origin) is obvious, the records have been kept together. By and large, though, order was hit-and-miss: for example, some records dating to the 1910s were found nestled among papers dating from decades after the fact – for no apparent reason, suggesting that the former might have been separated from records of a similar age and origin at some point along the line. Other folders were simply labelled "Archives" – offering no further information. Discretion and careful cross-referencing are key to imposing order.

Rehousing. If imposing order involves making sense out of a large collection scattered among binders, boxes, folders and filing cabinets, then rehousing is about ensuring that the records are moved from these disparate containers into specially-designed archival storage boxes – while mitigating damage in the process. After some delays, a large pallet of archival supplies from the Carr McLean archival supply firm finally arrived at St. Paul's on July 17, with rehousing beginning in earnest shortly thereafter.

A glance at the collections storage cupboard in the archive room will reveal row upon row of CARMAC document storage boxes. In these are the records, all sorted into brand-new acid-free folders according to type (or series): correspondence, financial records, minutes and reports, and parish histories, to name a few categories outlined in the Diocese of Toronto's retention guidelines. (Records that have not necessarily fit into these categories have been grouped under the heading "assorted papers" – and these have covered a large variety of files reflecting particular activities and subjects.)

The process of rehousing has involved setting aside a <u>considerable</u> number of duplicate copies that were otherwise taking up space; segregating any records that require special conservation treatment (e.g. removing mould or more intricate repairs); and removing rubber bands and an enormous quantity of metal objects that could cause damage. In case you were wondering, this has included about 40 brass fasteners of various sizes, more than 150 paperclips, and about 1,650+ staples! In their place are colourful plastic archival clips that will cause no tears and leave no stains on the records.

As this issue of *The Grapevine* goes to press, approximately 5 linear metres (about 17 feet) of records have been rehoused.

It has taken a great deal of work, but I am happy to report that we can now find records with considerably more ease than was the case previously. And the rehousing process has ensured that any outstanding issues have been identified and where possible mitigated.

So what's next? Using a similar document from St. James' Cathedral as a template, I have been working on developing a comprehensive archives policy for St. Paul's. I will also be scanning records with the ultimate goal of making them accessible to researchers. The intellectual organization of the collection into fonds, sous-fonds, series, files, and items according to the "rules of archival description" (RAD) is also ongoing. For this we will soon be applying for a second DHCP grant.



CHURCH PROPERTY UPDATE

As always let's start with the good news:

• All rents continue to be up to date and have been increased by 2.5 percent Sept 1/24 in keeping with Prov. Guidelines.

Now the bad news; as always buildings require upkeep and repair:

- The Church heating system required a pressure relief valve, a pressure reducing valve and backflow prevention.
- Zone control valves that were leaking in the Church lower hall have been replaced.
- Flex hose in washroom broke and had to be replaced.
- Leak under kitchen sinks was found and repaired
- Church brick work high above West entrance door has been repaired.
- A/C covers and storm windows have been installed for winter around the Church and outside water turned off.
- 34 Glenelg required a new ceiling fan and a new pressure switch for the furnace.
- 32 Glenelg required eave trough repairs and cleaning of eave troughs
- 38 Glenelg Lower has a new Tenant and the storm window repaired on second floor
- 36 Glenelg required a new Furnace and kitchen floor. Tile floor was replaced.

Synod Series (Part 1)

What is Synod?

A Synod is a gathering of lay and clerical members who constitute the governing body of the Church. This has been the most common way of involving the laity in the governance of the Church. Synod is made up of all the licensed clergy in the Diocese and lay members (non-clergy). At its annual vestry meeting, each parish (or congregation, in the case of a multi-point parish) elects lay members to attend the Diocesan Synod, which usually meets every other year.

What happens at Synod?

At Synod, members determine, at a high level, the priorities for Synod Council and its committees and refocus the mission of the Church throughout the Diocese. Synod gatherings are a time of worship, inspiration and education, and a forum for affirming the direction of our ministry together. To carry on the work of Synod between its sessions, Synod Council meets regularly.

St. Paul's currently sends two laity members to Synod. Synod expenses are covered by St. Paul's for meals and accommodation and usually is held from a Friday morning to Saturday at 2 pm.






