Ask & Imagine: Insights from your Incumbent Rev. Bonnie Skerritt Mar. 2025



Over the next couple of months, both in the Church and in our environment, we will journey through a time of transformation. We begin March completely blanketed in snow and with the imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday to kick-off our season of Lent. My hope is that by the time we get to the glory of the Resurrection on Easter Sunday, we will also be surrounded by the glory of spring flowers and budding trees.

It is amazing how quickly the transformation of our environment can take place once new growth begins to happen. I am always amazed at snow-

drops and crocuses that manage to get growing before the snow is even gone. They are a testament to how growth can be happening in places where it is not obviously apparent. They do their work of growing and pushing forward in God's time, not according to any other plan.

This Lent, we will have the opportunity for spiritual growth, both through the Lenten study #LiveLent: Our Story, God's Story and the Lenten retreat day. I encourage you to take part in both of these opportunities as you are able. Use this Lent as a time of transformation in your spiritual life through self-reflection and prayer. Look to see the green sprouts of new life, and do not give up if they are not obviously apparent from the beginning. This is just the Holy Spirit taking time, "beneath the snow" to prepare the bulb of your soul. Keep pushing forward and you may be surprised when and how you sprout!

I pray that these words about spiritual maturity from St. Paul inspire and sustain you throughout your Lenten journey. "God's goal is for us to become mature adults—to be fully grown, measured by the standard of the fullness of Christ. As a result, we aren't supposed to be infants any longer who can be tossed and blown around by every wind that comes from teaching with deceitful scheming and the tricks people play to deliberately mislead others. Instead, by speaking the truth with love, let's grow in every way into Christ." - Ephesians 4:13b-15 (CEB)



The Canon's Corner: The Rev. Canon Greg Physick Mar. '25



While Easter comes quite late this year, Lent seems to have arrived so quickly. Perhaps it is because Ash Wednesday, March 5th, was really noticed as one turned the calendar from February to March. How will you live out this time the Church gives us? Disciplines of giving up chocolate or taking on some special reading are recalled and are always in need of updating—for each of us is different from the person one was many years ago, and even last year. Life has offered its goodness and its challenges. God's Spirit whispers anew.

We live in a time of political turmoil, war and calls for peace, the cries of hunger and need from those on our streets. We will brush aside the plea or offer a loonie or two, perhaps offer to buy a coffee. We go our way and wonder, perhaps mumbling a quiet prayer. This season of Lent will once again hold moments of reflection, prayer, questions and frustration. 'How long, O Lord, how long'. As God's children in Christ, we will sing out the good news of Christ's resurrection on Easter Day, April 20th . As we move towards that day, Lent calls us to be still, and then be still again—and again-- and listen to the whispers of the Spirit.

There just is so much that is before us, behind us, around us, above us, beneath us, within us. It can be exhausting. Each Lent is a time to take time. Over many years I have appreciated words of Henry Ernest Hardy (1869-1946), an English Anglican priest and monk, affectionately known as Father Andrew. He wrote prose and poetry some of which is in a book given me 50 years ago by an Episcopal priest who had an impact on my journey. One piece is found in our hymn book, Hymn 197 "O Dearest Lord, Thy Sacred Head". I leave it to you to take a little time and effort to search it out in hard copy or through Google. As you read it, may your head, hands, feet and heart know the blessings sent forth by our Lord Jesus Christ.

In that book, 'A Gift of Light', the introduction by Gertrude Behanna speaks of a discipline Fr. Andrew lived out in the war years in London. His first act each morning was to take down the blackout curtains: to let the light in, he said, not the darkness out. The author wrote: "That's it. That is where mankind gets on the dead end track, trying to let the darkness out instead of allowing the light in....." She writes, moving from light coming in, to love: "Bless you, Fr. Andrew, for making it clear that love is never what we do; it is what we let be done to us. We are cups, receptacles; our part is to hold ourselves right side up that God may fill us with Himself." Yes, let light in! Yes, let love in!

As we journey through this holy season, may we be such cups that God may fill us with Himself, and Easter's good news of Resurrection may fill our souls in these difficult times.

Highlights of the 2025 Annual Vestry Meeting—February 23, 2025

The Annual Vestry Meeting was called to order at 12:08 p.m. There were 47 members in attendance. Reverend Bonnie Skerritt opened the meeting with prayer. She read the Vestry Declaration and explained it. Janice Ross was appointed Vestry Clerk. There were no questions, comments or corrections from the February 25, 2024 minutes. A motion was made by Fred Welling and seconded by Betty Drummond to accept the 2024 Vestry Minutes as written. Passed. No one opposed.

Incumbent, Wardens and Committee Reports

A motion was made by Doug Read and seconded by Barb Truax to accept these reports as written. Passed. No one opposed.

Audited 2023 Financial Report

These are the audited financial statements from the year ending December 31, 2023. Tom Ross made the following motion: "That the audited 2023 financial statements and report, as received from Peter Shennett Professional Corporation, be accepted by Vestry". Se-conded by Betty Tyndall. One person opposed. Passed.

Highlights of the Financial Report 2024: Tom Ross, Treasurer

Tom Ross thanked Marlene Wood (Envelope Secretary), Marg Brohm (Designated Givings), Don Brohm (rental properties and rent), Linda Todd (Gift Cards), Megan O'Neill (Bookkeeper) and Paul Carpentier (Acting Treasurer) for their dedication and help throughout the year. Tom made the following motion: "That the unaudited 2024 Financial Report, as presented, be accepted by Vestry, subject to audit verification". Seconded by Paul Carpentier. One person opposed. Passed.

Total receipts for 2024 were 33% over budget. Total disbursements were 0.01% over budget. However, the 2024 finances of the church were impacted by several extraordinary or unusual items. In summary, a year which would have otherwise resulted in a significant deficit was saved mostly due to the generosity of our late parishioners and the hours volunteered by our temporary office staff. A vote was held to accept the unaudited 2024 Financial Report, as presented. The motion passed with one opposed.

Highlights of the Presentation of the 2025 Budget Part One: Tom Ross

Tom Ross thanked the members of the Finance Committee, Management Team and the Advisory Board for their help and input. Tom made a motion to accept the 2025 Budget, as presented. Seconded by Barb Truax. The bottom line is we are budgeting for a \$94,672 deficit for Fiscal 2025.

Highlights of the Presentation of the 2025 Budget Part Two: Paul Carpentier

Paul noted the increasing deficit in recent years, and said that the budget could be pared down by cancelling exterior paint work, and custodial work being done by volunteers. Paul made a motion to remove these two expenses from the proposed budget, leaving a new budget deficit of \$62,725, seconded by Fred Welling. The motion passed, with no one opposed.

Paul thanked Arlene Gray for her wonderful work as music director and office administrator. Arlene will also be handling the church website, a cost savings. Paul said the church has saved money on utilities due to lowered thermostats, and hopes lawn cutting can be done by volunteers. Paul is hoping to get our diocesan allotment lowered; since we provide low-income housing. Paul then proposed an idea for reducing or even eliminating the \$62,725 deficit for 2025. He has calculated St. Paul's financial shortfall on a daily, weekly and monthly basis. Then he broke this down further in the hopes that parishioners might donate \$0.47 per day, \$3.30 per week, or \$14.32 per month, to cover the deficit. A package will be mailed out to all parishioners who were not present at Vestry. The allotment for Synod delegates was reduced. Paul made a motion to accept the amended 2025 budget. Seconded by Tom Ross. The budget passed with two opposed.

Appointments and Elections

Rev. Bonnie thanked Betty Hooper and Donna Gushue for their service as Rector's Warden and Chair of Advisory Board, respectively. Doug Read presented the Nominating Committee Report. Graham Walsh has been appointed Rector's Warden. Betty Hooper will be Past Warden. Linda Todd and Fred Welling were acclaimed as Members at Large on Advisory Board.

Other Business


Rev. Bonnie presented the Social Justice Vestry Motion 2025: Protecting and Expanding Harm Reduction in Ontario. Gail Payne moved to endorse the motion, seconded by Donna Gushue. A vote was held: In favour – 15, Opposed – 8, Abstentions – 7. The motion passed. Paul Carpentier thanked Tom Ross for his many years of service as Treasurer and for his support during Paul's training period. The meeting was adjourned at 1:50 p.m.

Introducing our new Rector's Warden: Graham Walsh

Graham has been married to his wife Kim for 38 years and they have two adult sons. He was raised in Toronto where he married and worked as a postman for twelve years. He then moved to England to study and travel. While in England he earned a B.A. In Theology as well as a P.H.D. in Biblical Studies from Birmingham University and a Certificate in Biblical Studies from Cambridge University, as well as a High School and Adult Teaching Certificate from Neuman College, Birmingham.

While in England he taught high school religious studies, adult higher education, English as a Second Language, A level sociology, and taught at several different secondary comprehensive schools. He was a member of the Church of England where he served as a Deputy Church Warden and Eucharistic Minister at St. Mary and St. Ambrose, Birmingham.




He retired three years ago and moved to Lindsay where he is a member of the Lindsay Book Club and teaches English as a Second Language at St. Paul's. twice a week.

PEOPLE'S WARDEN REPORT – Paul Carpentier

Thank you to everyone who attended our Annual Vestry on February 23rd and participated in our review of all the things that happened in 2024.

More importantly I am grateful for the opportunity we had to discuss the 2025 budget and make you aware of the realities and challenges we are facing. I trust by discussing how our funds come in and expenses go out, in a "Big Picture" format, you came to understand how little "wiggle room" there is and why I as people's warden and interim treasurer am concerned. Each parishioner has received a letter from me outlining the issue, along with a request to help, AS YOU ARE ABLE, by contributing to the "Deficit Reduction Fund" (Designated Givings #7) to off-set a day's/a week's/or a month's shortfall. If anyone has questions about this initiative, please speak with me.

Thank you for your response to the "Buy a Key" Fundraiser towards our purchase of a baby grand piano for \$1,800. Arlene found this beautiful instrument and got us a terrific deal on the same. This 115 year old young instrument was built in the day when your name was synonymous with your reputation for quality work. We are fortunate to be graced with the sound and visual appeal of this piano, as well as the skill Arlene brings to us each Sunday when it is played.

Thank you to the 7 people who have come forward to help us keep our custodial duties in house, saving the church close to \$10,000 in salaries. Sharing these duties will continue the level of cleanliness Don and Marg provided last year.

Thank you to Betty Hooper for her service as the Rector's warden for the last two years. It was a pleasure to work alongside, and learn, from this deeply committed Christian who is so well versed in the bible. I will miss your "Well fix it dear Henry" approvals!

I will close by wishing all a Lenten journey that brings us closer to Christ in our walk with Him.





<u>Angel Tree:</u> we bought, wrapped and delivered Christmas gifts to 7 children whose parent is in incarceration, in order to maintain and strengthen their relationships.

<u>Spring Outreach Service</u>: on May 4 Rev. Judith Alltree will speak to us on her work with the Mission to Seafarers.

Your Outreach Committee has decided to increase our donation to programs listed under Outreach Givings. We have been giving each \$150 but will increase that to \$200 now.

FAMILY ACTIVITIES FOR LENT

Family Time Activities for Lent: Learning about Praying

An excerpt from Rings, Kings and Butterflies: Lessons on Christian Symbols for Children by Harriet VanderMeer - Submitted by Rev. Bonnie

Here are some ideas to share with the children in your family about praying, which is a central principle of Lent.

Symbol/Object: Hands_

<u>Verses to Learn</u>: Because your steadfast love is better than life, my lips will praise you. So I will bless you as long as I live; I will lift up my hands and call on your name. Psalm 63:3-4_ The Lord's eyes are on the righteous and his ears are open to their prayers. 1 Peter 3:12

A Children's Message

If I ask you to fold your hands and close your eyes, what am I asking you to do? Whether we pray alone or with other people, we usually fold our hands. Or we might hold our open hands together, palm to palm. Sometimes we pray holding hands with other people around a table or to form a circle.

If the crossing guard holds her hand to traffic, what does she want the traffic to do? If someone asks you to put your hand on the Bible, what are you asked to do? If a baby reaches his hands up to you, what does he want you to do? If I wring my hands like this, what am I doing? If someone cups his hands together ...and extends them, he is often asking another person to give him something.

When I hold my hand out to you like this, I am telling you that I want to shake your hand. Is that a friendly gesture? If I cover my face with my hands, what do you think I am feeling? Some people, especially those who can't hear, communicate with their hands using sign language. You will know what I mean if I raise my hand to "give you five." If we clap our hands loudly what are we showing? A potter shapes a pot with her hands. ... If I gently and warmly place my hands on your face or throw you a kiss, what am I showing you? Hands can express love, warmth, and support, but they can also show fear, anger, and sadness.

Many times when we read about God in the Bible, there is a reference to God's hands. Moses said to God, "Your right hand, O LORD, glorious in power—your right hand, O LORD, shattered the enemy" (Exodus 15:6). God's hands are powerful: they can heal and they can hurt. We can feel God's hands on us and all around us. This week, gently lay your hands on the people around you. Hold hands with someone who is afraid. Your hands can be helping hands. You can clap your hands in joy, raise your hands in praise to God, gently touch others' hands in love, and fold your hands in quiet prayer to God. Your hands can show what is in your heart.

Pray with Children

Dear God, we thank you for hands, including ours. We thank you also for the big and little things your hands have done for us. Teach us to use our hands in loving ways for others, and to fold them in praise and prayer to you. Amen

To Do Together

Before meals this week (or before going to bed), ask the members of your family to hold hands together and raise them in praise to God as you offer a prayer of thanksgiving.

FIVE FINGER PRAYER



Five Finger Prayer

Thumb: Pray for those closest to you: your family and friends.

Pointer finger: pray for those who point you in the right direction: parents, teachers, mentors, and other leaders in your life. Pray for wisdom and support.

Tallest finger (third finger): pray for those that lead us: those in government, in business, in church leadership, in community leadership. Pray for guidance. **Ring finger** (weakest finger): Pray for those who are poor, sick, in pain, in trouble (those most in need).

Pinky finger (smallest finger): Pray for yourself and your own needs.
