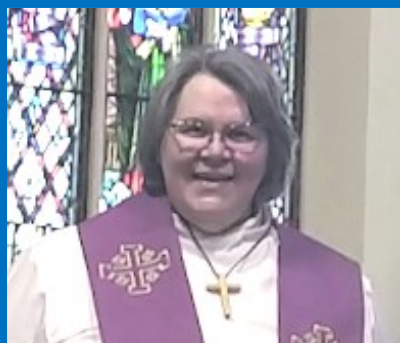

Over the course of the summer, I have had the opportunity to have discussions with parish leaders about both celebrating our 190th anniversary and looking beyond the anniversary to our future. We agree that those who built this parish, tended and nurtured it over almost two centuries and made sacrifices that bless us today. We also agreed that it is important that we create opportunities to leave that same blessing for future generations. As we have benefited from the legacy of past parishioners, we hope to provide a legacy for our future.

Everyone who is a member at St. Paul's, and many others in our community, would agree that Lindsay is a better place because St. Paul's exists. Try to estimate, if you can, the number of people who have shared a Christmas dinner here; the number of baptisms, weddings and funerals that have taken place in our sanctuary; the number of hugs that have happened during the funeral receptions or during fellowship; the number of laughs that have been had during one of our special dinners. And of course, underpinning all of this, is our Outreach work and food ministry. All of these things have been important to parishioners and the wider community over the decades and will continue to be important well into the future. This begs the question, "how do we ensure that the blessing of St. Paul's that we inherited continues to be a blessing to future generations?"

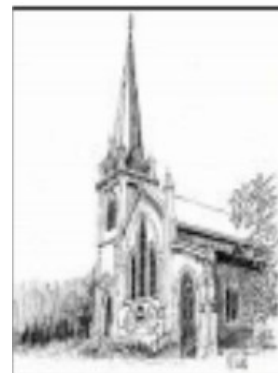

We have begun working with Stewardship Development at the Synod Office to see what might be possible at St. Paul's regarding a legacy fund. 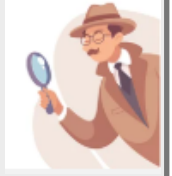

Warden's Letter by Diane Stecher/Paul Carpentier

Our "summer-time" in the hall has come to an end and we now head into our busy autumn season. It has been encouraging to see increased attendance during the summer, and we look forward to Back-to-Church Sunday when we return to St. Paul's beautiful sanctuary for our services. Please plan to attend this service and the indoor BBQ on September 13th .

A number of projects have happened over the summer:

- The tower repairs have been completed. Necessary brickwork, wood preservation and painting have restored the integrity and "curb appeal" significantly. We are grateful for the extra work done by Carnegie Construction, over and above the contracted specs, at no extra cost. We are extremely grateful for those parishioners who have made designated contributions that will cover over a third of the cost for this project!
- The main washrooms, the kitchen and the spaces between the main hall and church have all been painted to co-ordinate with the main hall colour scheme. It was done at no cost to the church. It sure has brightened up these spaces!
- A new "Information Center" has been created that also doubles as a façade for our chair/table storage area. Having all this material just to the right as you come in, rather than scattered on the walls, will give the events better visibility and "tidy up" the hall.
- Tia Chi and Community Care both continued to hold their classes all summer and kept the space being "lived-in". We appreciate these two tenants and look forward to the return of the Lindsay Horticultural Society this month.

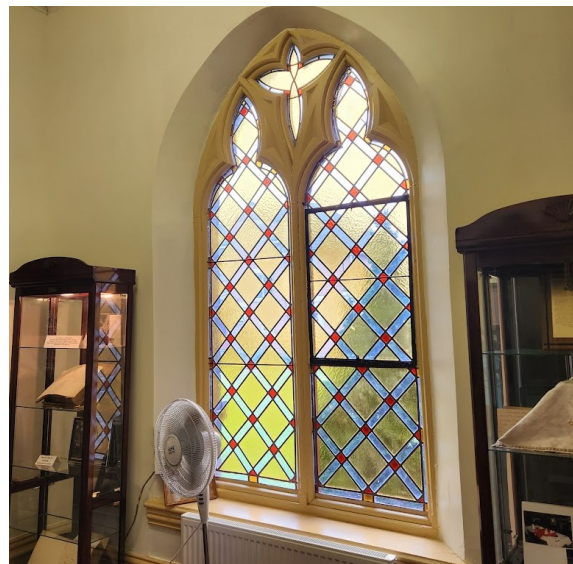
Projects in Progress:

- The Finance Committee is working on a couple of projects to help address our annual operating cost shortfalls, today and in the future. You will hear more about this effort over the next 3 months.
- We will be tearing down the older portion of the red shed at the back of the parking lot, as it has become a safety issue.
- We are getting quotes to replace the exterior UV protection glass on 12 of our stained glass windows and to re-stain the main church doors. This work may have to wait until next year.
- In-house, we will be repairing the interior trim of all the church stained glass windows and re-painting the same. This has been needed for some time.
- In-house we will also get the front door railings prepped and re-painted. Is this something you might wish to volunteer to take on?

We give our thanks to all who are giving of their time and talents to complete all the tasks required to keep St. Paul's running smoothly. Together, in sharing the workload, we can continue to accomplish great things in our church and community.



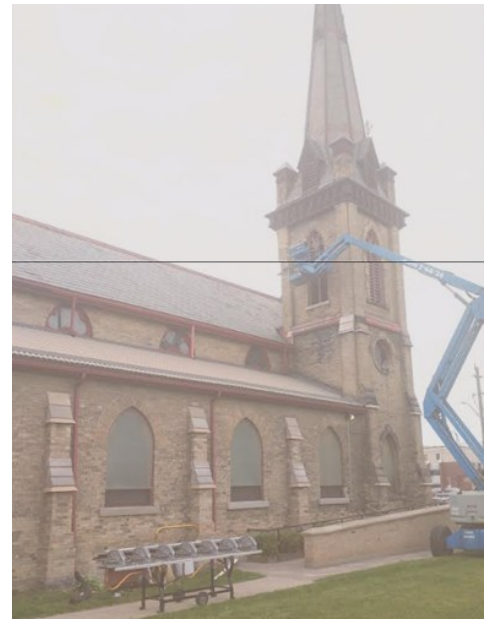

4. The Marsh Memorial Hall Turns 100

For most of us, the Marsh Memorial Hall is where congregational life at St. Paul's plays out – whether it be through ticketed events like the Mystery Dinners and Strawberry Suppers; community-focused functions like the Christmas Day dinner; or simply the weekly after-church coffee social. It has been rented out for the purposes of Tai Chi, hosted a 1950s-style sock hop, and has reechoed with the sound of children laughing and singing as they gear up for festive pageants.

And this year, the Marsh Memorial Hall turns 100 years old.

Opened with great fanfare in November of 1926, the new facility replaced an older parish hall that measured 30 feet in width by 60 feet in length. The footprint of the rebuilt hall sported more generous dimensions of 30 feet by 80 feet, with dedicated space on the first floor for the Sunday school, the minister's vestry, and choir rooms. This main floor could also accommodate a banquet hall and kitchen. Upstairs, meanwhile, was a large room expressly designed as an auditorium capable of accommodating 300 or more people. (This space, with its high ceiling and remnants of what was apparently a much-larger stage, retains much of the look and feel of its original function.) Five classrooms were located on this second storey, which have since been repurposed into office space.



The Rt. Rev. James F. Sweeny, Bishop of Toronto, officiated at the dedication ceremonies, which got underway with the reading of Psalm 24 and the singing of “O God, Our Help In Ages Past.” Local dignitaries and clergy from other churches were in attendance. It was quite a splendid affair.

In his opening remarks, Bishop Sweeny enumerated the various purposes the new Marsh Memorial Hall would fill – for both St. Paul's and the community it served. These remarks, reprinted in the Nov. 25, 1926, edition of The Lindsay Daily Post, are copied here verbatim. Despite renovations made over the years, the space still fulfills much of what it was originally designed to do:

1. “To be the nursery of the church, to bring along the little children for the parish church of St. Paul's. Here they will be trained to be good Christian citizens.”

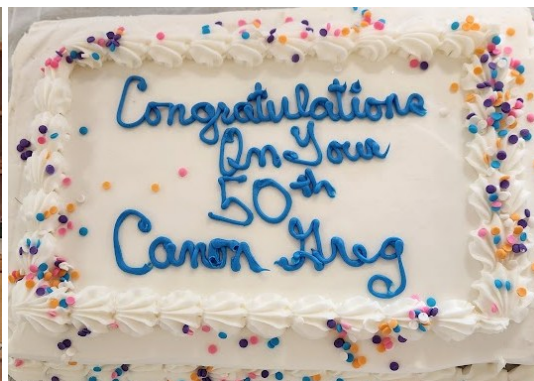
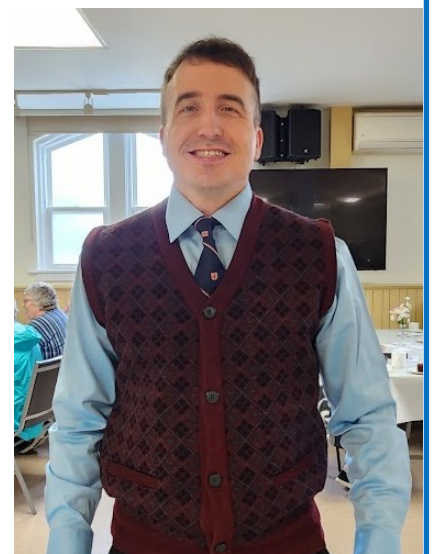
2. "That this hall will be sort of a parliament legislative chamber, where the policies for the parish will be formulated."
3. "It is to be a sort of bible training school, in which the handbooks are the Bible, and Book of Common Prayer. The Bible Training School takes the place of the Sunday School and has well-graded classes under the direction of the clergy."
4. "It will constitute a power house for the activities of this church and the parish. I like to think of the power of zeal, which young people can generate here in this power house of spiritual power of God."
5. "It will be the centre of the social life of the parish."

Thereafter, Bishop Sweeny made a remark that seems preposterous today to the point of being comical: "There used to be an aspersion cast upon Anglicans that they were frigid and unsociable. All this can never be said again, for I am sure we have developed a splendid spirit of sociability."

A century after the overseer of this diocese uttered these words, the people of St. Paul's can be justly proud of the fact that the Marsh Memorial Hall continues be the place where that splendid spirit of sociability is cultivated for the good of the congregation, the community, and the Kingdom of God.

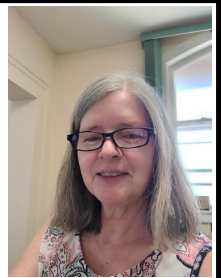

- 1) Let's start with good news and report as always; all rents are up to date.
- 2) RENTAL PROPERTIES heating systems checked for winter.
- 3) 32 Glenelg required a new circulating pump and back flow preventor for the boiler.
- 4) 38 Glenelg required heat exchanger for the furnace.
- 5) 41 Russell and 34/36 Glenelg were fine.
- 6) 36 Glenelg had some eave trough that came loose and had to be reattached.
- 7) We have some lights in the church hall that requires attention for ballasts.
- 8) 38 Glenelg still requires new water meter as per City request and we have to work through Double R Plumbing on this item.
- 8) Rent increases will be in effect in September for Glenelg St properties.

We seek justice for all, walk alongside those in need, and respond with loving service and prophetic advocacy. In that spirit, all parts of the Diocese of Toronto are called to:

4. Recognize and act on opportunities to participate in God's healing work in the world.
5. Make explicit connections between following Jesus and working for justice and peace.
6. Strengthen Indigenous ministry; engage non-Indigenous Anglicans in reconciliation work.
7. Take, sustain and communicate actions that promote diversity, equity, inclusion and anti-racism.
8. Intensify advocacy and action in response to the climate crisis.

REIMAGINING MINISTRY:

We support and encourage faithful and fruitful ministry by all who serve the life of the Church. In that spirit, all parts of the Diocese of Toronto are called to:

9. Actively embrace collaboration among congregations and innovation in new forms of ministry.
10. Better reflect the diversity of our communities in both congregations and clergy.
11. Understand the changing needs of lay leaders in congregations and support them in their work.
12. Continue and enhance support for all ordained people.
13. Enable and celebrate the work of ministries focused on service in the world.
14. Rethink clergy discernment, formation and deployment for the Church of the future.
15. Introduce and use new ways to measure and nurture congregational health and effectiveness

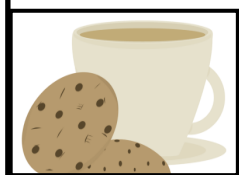

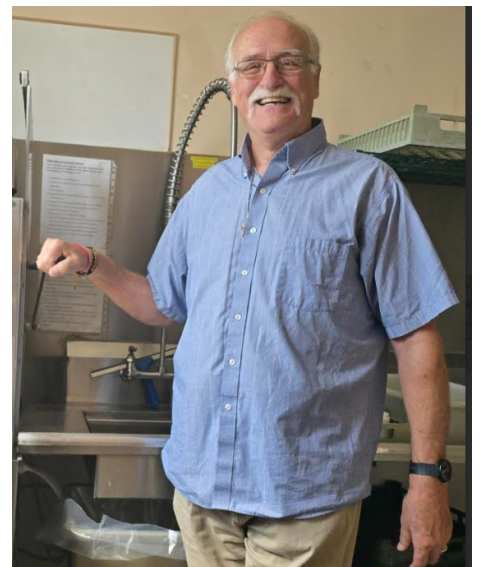
